





Forest Management Plans



- Define goals and objectives
 - o What do you want out of your property?
 - o What is your desired future stand condition?
- Identifies current property conditions:
 - Physical and biological setting
 - Management constraints



Is meant to help you actively manage your forestland for the next 5-10 years and into the future





Importance of Having a Plan



- Forest Management Plans help you define your goals and provides a road map to managing your property into the future
- Know where you are going so you don't get lost \rightarrow prioritize goals and treatments
- Understand the ecology of your forestland and how to manage for the future
- Overtime, are you seeing the results you want? \rightarrow adaptive management












Getting Ready for Your RPF




- Clearly articulate your goals and objectives (think both short and long term)
- Think about what type and size of treatments you can feasibly take on (physically, emotionally, financially...)
- Is there anything you really want to do or are not willing to do?
- Do you have any constraints (CC&Rs, Conservation Easements) or assets (equipment or skills)?
- Research the history of the property or area





Property Map

- Walk your roads and trails
- Know your streams and springs
- Identify your infrastructure
- Get to know your stand types
- Identify other special areas of interest





California Forest Improvement Program (CFIP)

Resource Conservation District Mendocino County

- Program of CAL FIRE
- Funded by Prop 68 bond measure
 - Applications are accepted year-round but ranked only 4x per year
- Must hire a Registered Professional Forester (RPF)
- Must have an approved Forest Management Plan (FMP) to apply for veg treatment
 - Can apply to complete an FMP through CFIP
- Incentive payments are 75-90% of CFIP's cap rates (actual costs may exceed cap rates)
- Incentive payments released after project completed with proof of contractor payment
- Restrictions: Must have \geq 20 ac of land; treatment units must be \geq 5 ac



How to Apply for CFIP



- The required pieces of a complete application package are:
- Four original CFIP Agreements
- One each:
 - ✓ CFIP Application
 - ✓ Payee Data Record
 - ✓ CFIP Project Budget
 - ✓ Project description
 - ✓ RPF checklist
 - ✓ Vicinity map
 - ✓ Project Map

California Forest Improvement Program

The purpose of the California Forest Improvement Program (CFIP) is to encourage private and public investment in, and improved management of, California forest lands and resources. This focus is to ensure adequate high quality timber supplies, related employment and other economic benefits, and the protection, maintenance, and enhancement of a productive and stable forest resource system for the benefit of present and future generations.

water quality. Cost-share assistance is provided to private and public ownerships containing 20 to 5,000 acres of forest land, Cost-shared activities include:

- Preparation of a Forest Management Plan by a Registered Professional Forester (RPF)
- RPF Supervision of the following:
 - Reforestation

Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP)

- Program of the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS)
- Provides free technical assistance by resource professional
- May chose to apply for incentives payments that help offset costs to complete work
 - Applications are accepted year-round but ranked only 3-4x per year
- Incentive payments are a flat rate per acre \$ amount depends on type of work preformed
- Incentive payments released after project completed
- Program NOT meant to cover complete cost of project
- Restrictions: Cannot grow cannabis; cannot have AGI >\$900,000





Production/Business

☐ Family legacy: pass on the property to the next generation
Address trespass concerns, particularly in regards to environmental degradation from trespass cannabis grows and/or off-highway vehicle effects on soil and water quality
☐ Increase and/or maintain aesthetics of the property

Forest Health
☐ Wildfire protection and fuel load reduction/promote fire resilient forest
☐ Prevent and/or control insects and/or disease (list)
☐ Increase stocking (e.g., reforestation; list species)
☐ Increase species diversity (list preferred species)
☐ Increase growth/promote large diameter trees
☐ Manage forest roads to reduce movement of sediment into streams and other water bodies
☐ Reduce erosion of streambanks and gullies
☐ Increase quality of wildlife habitat (list species and/or habitat characteristics)
☐ Maintain or enhance oak woodland, native grassland, or other plant communities
☐ Manage to increase tree cover and/or ground cover in riparian areas or along streams
☐ Increase quality of in-stream aquatic habitat
☐ Reduce/manage invasive weeds
☐ Manage for climate resilient forests and long-term carbon storage
