- Assign activities project members can complete at home and submit completed work back to Project Leader (Baking Project – baking cookies, photography – share photos, etc.)
- Poster of livestock breeds/knowledge (Rabbit Project sharing varieties of Rabbit breeds)
- Sharing videos of project aspects (Horse project confirmation of a horse)

What is an Emerald Star?

Fresno County offers 4-H'ers the opportunity to earn an Emerald Star. The Emerald Star program is designed for intermediate and senior 4-H members ages 13 and up. The Emerald Star project's purpose includes:

- 1. Providing an opportunity for 4-H members to develop projects in their community or in 4-H beyond the club level.
- 2. Improving, creating, and expanding 4-H programs.

Helping individual 4-H members grow and improve in the areas of organization, leadership, and project planning. This program is designed to help youth learn about project planning, organization, and presentation.

Typically, youth develop an action plan for some type of multi-county event. They then organize and facilitate this event. After completion and presentation of their project, they are awarded with the Emerald Star ranking. Those members wishing to apply for the "Homer Williams Scholarship" must have completed an Emerald Star Project. For more detail see the county website
