Pin Placement on the 4-H Hat

The 4-H uniform hat is a source of pride for the California 4-H Youth Development Program. California is the only state to have a 4-H uniform hat! Many members use the hat to display their achievement pins. A 4-H uniform hat is NOT required for membership in the California 4-H Youth Development Program or for participation in any 4-H activity, event, or occasion.

Did you recently earn 4-H recognition and are unsure where to place them on your 4-H hat?

Right side of Hat

4-H year Completion Stripes earned go behind the UCANR Logo, on the right side of the hat. Year completion pins (primary, junior, intermediate & senior) - are placed above the year stripe in which the pin was earned, starting with the primary pins next to the UCANR logo, Officer pins are aligned with the year they were earned and go above the year completion pins. 100% Attendance Pins are placed below the stripe of the year the pin was earned.



Left side of Hat

All Star Ambassador, Platinum, Gold, Silver or Bronze stars are placed on the front. (*You may cascade the stars if you would like, as shown.*)

Place the Junior/Teen Leadership emblems and the Hi 4-H patch (in that order) behind the stars.

All other earned pins may be placed in any order on the top portion of the hat.



Bed Construction Rules:

The bed frame needs to be a twin or full size. Only metal frames.

Clubs will need to provide their own frames and tires.

Must have a foot and head board (which can be made out of different material)

Beds can have a bed box spring or a mattress (twin or full size) and must be laid flat. Mattress or bed box spring needs to be secured to the frame safely and supported underneath. **NO AIR MATTRESSES.**

Beds must have 4 wheels, one in each corner. All four wheels must have contact to the ground at all times. All wheels must be load-bearing but do not have to be the same size.

Push bars/handles are allowed but may not extend more than 16 inches away from the bed frame. They cannot have sharp or jagged edges.

Motorized or mechanical means of motion are not allowed. Human power only. No brakes or steering.

The bed must be constructed in a fashion so that the race team has full visibility of the raceway.

Clubs name must be displayed on the bed and securely fastened.

Safety Rules:

Each club will have a committee consisting of: Chairperson, Decorators, Welders, Runners (4), and 1 Bed Rider.

If your club has more interest and has the capability to have more than one team, you will need committees/teams for each club team

Welders, runners and bed rider must be age 9 by December 31, 2022.

The race will be done with 2 at a time. The best of each heat race will continue on to the next race.

Bed rider must stay on the bed at all times and must either sit or lay down but needs to be sure they are able to stay on the bed safely. **NO STANDING** or you will be disqualified.

Runners must wear a helmet and good running shoes.

Bed runners and rider must wear a helmet or protective head gear at all times during the race. All team members must wear closed toed shoes. Knee and elbow pads are encouraged but not required.

All 4 runners must be in contact with the bed at all times during the race.

Runners are responsible for maintaining an overall safe operation of propelling the bed and stopping their bed.

Pushing the bed only, no pulling.

All 5 team members must pass the finish line (with bed) in order to win.

Have fun and be creative with your patriotic themed decorations! There will be an award for the bed race winner and a people's choice!

It is the responsibility of the hosting club to ensure facility is reserved, event information is published in the newsletter, event task sheet is completed, to find help (within and outside the club) to ensure all job tasks for the event are assigned and accomplished, have a Club Representative at the event as the point person, to maintain good communication with the 4-H staff on the planning progress of the event, and to complete an event evaluation at the conclusion of the event.

Molly Rae's Goat Chili

Overall Junior Winner, El Camino Club

Ingredients:

2 lb of ground goat meat
 1 large sweet onion, chopped
 1 large green bell pepper, chopped
 2 cans of stewed tomatoes
 1 – 2 cans of tomato sauce
 1 can of tomato paste
 1 large can of blackbeans
 4 cloves of garlic, minced
 2 tablespoons of chili powder
 2 tablespoons of ground cumin
 1 teaspoon of chopped fresh or dry cilantro
 Salt to taste
 1/2 teaspoon of ground black pepper
 1/4 teaspoon of ground red cayenne pepper
 1 tablespoon of olive oil

In a medium skillet, heat 1 tablespoon of olive oil over medium to high heat. Add the onion and bell pepper, lower the heat, and sauté for about 10 minutes until nicely browned and caramelized. Be careful to not allow onions to stick to skillet. Dump sautéed vegetables into a large stew pot.

In stew pot with vegetables add stewed tomatoes, tomato sauce, tomato paste, and blackbeans. Start to simmer on low heat.

Goat is very lean so some additional oil in the skillet may be needed to prevent sticking. Place the goat-burger in the skillet used to sauté vegetables. Start to brown while mixing in the garlic, chili powder, cumin, cilantro, salt, pepper, and cayenne pepper.

Once well browned, add meat mixture to stew pot mixture. If mixture seems to be a little too thick additional tomato juice or sauce may need to be added to prevent sticking. Bring chili to a simmer and simmer for 1.5 to 2 hours, stirring occasionally. If a hotter taste is desired, adjust with pepper, chili powder, and/or Tabasco Sauce while simmering.

When done, serve with your favorite crackers, corn chips, tortillas, grated cheese, and/or sour cream.



Fair Updates

TEHAMA DISTRICT FAIR || MAY 4-7, 2023

2023 RULE CHANGES



- **Update Minimum & Maximum Sifting Weights**
 - **Market Steers: 1050 lbs - 1500 lbs**
 - **Poultry Meat Pens: 4 lbs - 7 lbs per Bird.**
All other species are the same as the previous year.
- **120 Day & 60 Day Tag-Ins**

All market animals must be tagged by the dates listed below. Leaders may check out ear tags, tag guns, and a clear plastic bag for the hair sample. A picture of the tagged animal with the exhibitor and a hair sample must be returned to the Fair Office by the ownership dates below.

 - **Market Steers 120 Day Weigh-In-** January 4th by 5:00 PM
 - **Market Lambs, Market Goats, Market Hogs-** March 6th by 5:00 PM
 - **Chickens and Rabbits must be owned for 30 Days-** April 4th
- **Fair Weigh-Ins**

Large Animal Weigh-Ins: Wed., May 3rd 3:00-6:30 PM
Poultry Inspections/Weigh-Ins: Wed., May 3rd 1:00-3:00PM by the Tehama Room
Market Rabbits: Thursday, May 4th at 10:00 AM in the Ron Knight Building

All animals, excluding poultry, can start arriving on the grounds Wed., May 3rd
- **Weighing Back-Up Animals at Fair Weigh-Ins**

If the exhibitor's primary market animal fails to meet weight requirements or fails the veterinary check at weigh-ins the "Back-Up" animal may be weighed.

Large Animals: The Back-Up Animal must be on grounds for it to be weighed, after the primary animal is sifted. If the first animal across the scale is NOT sifted, the back-up animal cannot be weighed or unloaded on the grounds.

Small Animals: If a pen of three is sifted for weight, defects, or veterinary issues at weigh-ins the exhibitor will have two options; either replace ONE animal in their pen for ONE other animal or the exhibitor may choose to replace the entire pen or another pen. The exhibitor must choose one or the other, they cannot do both.
- **DNA Testing**

The Tehama District Fair Board of Directors reserves the right to randomly DNA Test all animals.
- **The Dog Show has been eliminated from the Fair.**
- **Paylean Ingestion in Hogs:** Paylean must be withheld from market hogs for a minimum of 10 days prior to arrival at the Fair and cannot be administered at the Fair
- **Ensuring Exhibitors Wear their Uniform**

Exhibitors not wearing the proper uniform will not be able to enter the Show Ring or Sale Ring.

Tehama County 4-H Contract for Tehama District Fair Market Animal

This contract outlines the requirements that must be completed by the 4-H member to sell at the Tehama District Fair. Form must be completed and submitted to the Tehama County 4-H office by the end of the business day of the due date.

1. Be an active member in the 4honline enrollment system by **October's Council Meeting by 7 p.m.** (4th Tuesday) of the current program year.
2. Have submitted an Annual Project Report to your leader from the previous year. (Waived for 1st year members)
3. Complete at least six hours of your 4-H market animal project, or more, as required by the project leader.
4. Participate in a county event that is linked to your 4-H market animal project. (i.e. Beef Dish - Favorite Foods Day; Presentation on Swine - Swine Project)
5. Give a presentation at project, club, or county level in reference to your 4-H market animal project.
6. Meet the ownership requirements for your 4-H market animal project.
